# Student Council Support The Blue Tree Project April 1

On the last day of Term 1 our student councillors were hard at work painting a tree blue, for The Blue Tree Project. This is a mission that aims to start up uncomfortable discussions around mental health and to empower people to speak up when they are dealing with these issues. The main idea is that by painting these trees, it sends out the message that "it's OK to not be OK." This helps to reduce the stigma that still exists around mental health today.

The student councillors were inspired to participate and support the cause, choosing a tree inside the school grounds with the help of Ms Varina Earle and Mr Aaron Richards. CVC has embraced this cause to help students understand that mental health problems should not be stigmatised and that experiencing them is perfectly normal.

The Blue Tree Project is a vital cause, particularly among students. 1 in every 7 Australian students struggle with mental health problems, the most common of which are depression, ADHD, and anxiety. It is expected that the project at CVC will help to reduce the stigma associated with mental illness and create a more positive and accepting environment.

As part of their Certificate II in Hospitality students are required to complete service hours. A number of our students have been gaining these hours by assisting with the CVC Breakfast Club, serving toasted sandwiches to students who may have come to school without breakfast.

The CVC breakfast club runs from

8:00 to 8:30 outside GL13 Monday to Wednesday and is available to all students before school. It is run by our Education Assistants, with support provided by the College Chaplain our Certificate II Hospitality students.

The food is generously supplied by Foodbank WA (with bread generously supplied by parents or our local Woolworths). The Foodbank School Breakfast Program provides a nutritious breakfast for over 18,000 students every week, which is over 2.2 million serves a year. While soothing a rumbling tummy is the most immediate benefit, the impact on students, teachers and the community is far more profound than could be imagined when it began almost two decades ago, with links to capacity for learning, attitudes towards healthy eating and community engagement. The program also provides our Hospitality Students real world experience in preparing food and working on customer service skills.

# Earth and Environmental Science Students Head to the Beach March 31

Year 11 Earth and Environmental Science students combined great weather, spectacular views and hard work during an enjoyable fieldwork excursion to the river and coast on Friday. The excursion was guided by Australian Earth Science Education and took students to the banks of Freshwater Bay in Peppermint Grove to examine the exposed limestone cliffs formed by long-expired quarries.

Then it was onto Cottesloe Beach to examine the weathered rock face, wave-cut platforms, fossilised coral, mangroves and forest remains, providing students with insights to the geological and sea level history of the area dating back hundreds of thousands of years.

As a school, CVC answered over 130 thousand questions and placed 5th for Indonesian in WA, 22nd for Italian and 165th overall in Australia competing against 1,231 schools.




# **CVC Students Awarded Ron Sloan Endeavor Scholarships**

# Bullying No Way! Day March 19

At our school we aim to create a safe and supportive school community for everyone. Friday March 19th is the National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence, and is a day for schools, students and the community to say Bullying. No Way! The theme this year is to 'take action together.' This theme aims to elevate student voice, empowering our young Australians to join the conversation.

CVC students came together during break time today to partake in volleyball, basketball and colour parachute activities as part of the days celebrations.

Sometimes, it can be difficult for parents or carers to know what to do when their child talks to them about bullying. You are an important part of our work to prevent bullying and to respond effectively if it happens. Stopping bullying involves everyone. If your child talks to you about bullying:

- 1. Listen calmly and get the full story. Your calm response is important to allow your child to tell you all about the situation. After they've told you their story, ask questions to get more details if you need to: who, what, where, when. Although you may feel some strong emotions about your child's experience, try to keep calm to avoid more distress to your child.
- 2. Reassure your child they are not to blame. Many children blame themselves and this may make them feel even worse. You could say things like, 'That sounds really hard to deal with. No one should have to put up with that.' or 'I'm so glad you told me. You should be able to feel safe at school; that's not fair at all'.
- 3. Ask your child what they want to do and what they want you to do. A critical part of your response is to avoid jumping in to solve the problem. While it is natural to want to protect your child, helping them to find their own solution is a better option. It helps them feel they have some power in the situation.
- 4. **Visit www.bullyingnoway.gov.au to find some strategies.** The website has tips and ideas for different bullying situations. One idea is to practise strategies at home to help your child feel more confident.
- 5. **Contact the school.** Your child may be reluctant for you to do this, so discuss the idea and reassure them that the school would want to know and is able to help. Make an appointment to meet with your child's year coordinator. Contact the school immediately if you have a concern about your child's safety.
- 6. **Check in regularly with your child**. Keep the conversation going. It can take time to resolve issues, so check in regularly with your child about their experiences and their feelings. Your ongoing support is important.

"I enjoy working in this environment, as the customers and co-workers are really friendly. I also enjoy doing the work because it educates me and provides me with experience in preparation for my future career. It will be helpful when applying for a job as future employers can tell you have done a Certificate in Hospitality."

CVC regularly advertises any school based traineeships that are available within the community through a Connect notice. If you are interested in pursuing this, keep your eye on Connect or see the VET office.

Bailey is another successful example of being part of the School Based Traineeship program, this one being at KFC. Bailey and his parents were informed about the opportunity, and through a selection process was awarded the position.

Bailey likes that he gets to miss one day of school a week to go to work and loves earning his own money. He also enjoys meeting new people, and realises that the work experience, along with the Certificate at the end of the Traineeship, will help him pursue his career later in life.

Students were presented with information about a UWA Broadway Assured Pathway to the following postgraduate courses; Doctor of Medicine, Doctor of Dental Medicine, Doctor of Podiatric Medicine, and Master of Pharmacy, and were provided with details on the entry pathways available to them in order to achieve their goals. Students were also offered mentoring and support throughout their entry process by UWA staff.

# Senior Geography Students Complete Fieldwork at Nearer to Nature in Mundaring March 17











Part of the Geography course for Year 11 and 12 students is to participate in fieldwork, which is what our Geography students have been up to recently.

Ms McCathie's Year 12 General Geography class completed the unit on Fire Geography, where they undertook a guided walk with Mike from Nearer to Nature, and engaged in geographic fieldwork to examine the impacts of fire on both natural and managed Students discovered ecosystems. difference between bushfires and prescribed burning, and why prescribed burns are critical life, protecting property and the environment.

Students then examined the Parkerville fire of 2014 by exploring the prevention, mitigation and preparedness for this natural disaster in the managed and constructed elements of our environment. The class was also lucky enough to see a kangaroo and her joey just relaxing under a tree, near where they stopped for lunch. At the end of the fieldwork, students had a clearer understanding of: how fire affects the geographical environment, how topography and land management affects behaviour of fire, the importance of prescribed burning, and how you can be prepared.

The Year 12 ATAR Geography class and Year 11 General Geography class completed the unit on Sustainable Forestry. Students engaged in field techniques employed by forest managers to determine sustainable timber harvests and treatment of strands to maximise production while maintaining or enhancing biodiversity. They learned about timber being a versatile and widely used fibre-based commodity, and in an increasingly interconnected world, decisions we make about production and distribution of this commodity can no longer be considered in isolation.

Ms Michael's and Ms Barnes's students also discovered how modern forestry practices can allow us to sustainably meet our timber needs, whilst ensuring that forests can still be enjoyed for many other purposes and how the decisions we make in our society may have global consequences.

# STEM Students Examine Interrelated Numbers Through

Puzzles March 11

Year 7 students were challenged with thinking about how different types of numbers are interrelated, by working through a puzzle during their STEM class today. They first used a trial and error method to find a possible solution and then checked their answer to see if what they had was actually a solution or not.

The students worked cooperatively in groups to solve the problems, developing their interpersonal skills and ability to work in a team.

# Year 8's Learn the Concepts of Sublimation Using Dry Ice

March 10

Today the Year 8 science classes had fun with experiments using dry ice. Students have been studying the properties of solids, liquids and gases and their changes of state. All of the experiments conducted were used to demonstrate the concepts of sublimation, which is the transition of a substance directly from a solid state to a gas state, in this case, dry ice to CO2 gas.

The balloon activity demonstrated that a small pellet of dry ice sublimes to produce a huge volume of CO2 gas – more than enough to easily fill a balloon, and that a balloon full of CO2 is much heavier than a similar balloon full of normal air. The students also observed a foaming activity which made use of the sublimation of CO2 to









produce large amounts of foam – CO2 bubbles being trapped in detergent. Another experiment, the tin can activity, demonstrated to the classes the expansion of CO2 to a much greater volume as it sublimes, exerting huge pressure on the can until it 'blows' the lid off, and then the candle experiment showed that CO2 is more dense than air and can be 'poured' in the same way as a liquid until it covers the flames and extinguishes it. CO2 is usually invisible but it can appear as a whitish colour due to it cooling and condensing the water vapour present in the air to produce a cloud. Dry ice is frozen carbon dioxide, which as a gas makes up about 0.04% of the earth's atmosphere. It is the gas that we exhale when we breathe, and the gas that plants use in photosynthesis. Carbon dioxide is also the gas that is added to make soft drinks. Dry ice is commonly used for freezing or keeping things frozen as it maintains a very cold temperature of -78.5 degrees. Instead of melting, dry ice turns directly into carbon dioxide gas and does not melt like common ice.

# Year 12 ATAR Biology Students visit Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research March 3

Our Year 12 ATAR Biology students had an insight into what it was like to be a university student when they visited the Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research in Nedlands, last week. The students investigated how to use biotechnological techniques to; amplify a human gene with PCR, visualise the product with gel electrophoresis and identify the mutation with gene sequencing. They were specifically looking at the BRAF gene mutation that can contribute to melanoma.

Our students gained an insight into working in a cutting edge laboratory, investigating challenges like overcoming cancer in human populations. They spoke with presenters well into their science degrees, and had great success with their investigations which reinforced their knowledge of the biotechnological techniques.











## **WA State Champion for CVC Student Declan Somers**

After a successful weekend of athletics, Year 9 student Declan Somers became the 2021 WA State Champion in the U16 2000m steeplechase. Declan also ran a strong second place in the U16 3000m race and bronze in the U16 1500m race.

Declan has now qualified in all three events for the National Track and Field Championships to be held in Sydney in April. Congratulations Declan!




### Meet Our 2021 Student Council Members February 24

### Congratulations to the Year 12 Class of 2020 February 24



Congratulations to the graduating class of 2020 who persisted and rose to the challenge despite the difficulties of an unprecedented year. Our Year 12 ATAR students were outstanding in 2020, achieving a median ATAR of 80.2 (TISC) which puts Canning Vale College in the Top 20 Public Schools based on median ATAR results.

Amongst our 15 'like schools' (like schools are schools with a similar index of community socio-educational advantage) Canning Vale College ranked 2nd in terms of median ATAR performance. Some of the individual successes included College ATAR Dux Tej Balasubramani achieving an ATAR of 98.95. Tej along with his fellow CVC graduate and twin brother Tejas, have both gone on to study Medicine at Curtin University this year.

15 CVC students achieved an ATAR over 90, a further 26 students scoring between 80 and 90, and 12 students achieved an ATAR of between 70 and 80 (a total of 53 students out of 82 who undertook ATAR courses). These numbers represent front door entry into the major West Australian Universities. A number of students across WA were awarded a School Curriculum and Standards Authority Certificate of Excellence, Distinction or Merit. These awards recognise individual excellence at the end of senior secondary schooling. 22 of these awards went to CVC students. Well done to the following:
